



Dear friends and supporters of Denise Louie Education Center,

Our 2013-2014 has been a year of celebration and transition for Denise Louie. We celebrated the end of federal sequestration, and the award of our first five-year Early Head Start and Head Start grant as part of the new federal process.

After 17 years, our Executive Director, Janice Deguichi, decided to transition to a new role in the community. In reflecting back on her many contributions, we highlight a few:


- Led major capital campaign to raise \$2.1 million to complete our Beacon Hill site renovation project where over 150 children continue to receive preschool services every year;
- Negotiated a lease to serve 38 children annually at our Lake Washington site in the Rainier Beach community;
- Won a successful bid to start an Early Head Start home visiting program that now serves 110 children birth to five; and
- Served as the Head Start/Early Childhood Education Assistant Program State President to oppose an effort to dismantle Head Start by block granting the funding to the states.

Janice remains a significant part of the Denise Louie community, and we thank her for her tireless commitment to build a strong foundation for the next phase of Denise Louie's history. We are challenged and excited to find a new leader to continue our great work for the over 500 children and families we serve.



The Numbers

Total number of children served: 269

Head Start

Our program serves predominately immigrant/refugee families whose children are prenatal to five years old and have an income under \$23,850 for a family of four. Priority for children in foster care, homeless families and children with special needs, is given for enrollment into the program.

In our preschool program, we supported 177 children as part of our Head Start program, 76 children funded by the City of Seattle Families and Education Levy and 17 private pay families. Through a subcontract with Puget Sound Educational Service District, we served an additional 33 children which are not included in the previous chart.

Research suggests that immigrant populations are less likely than U.S. born citizens to be knowledgeable about health and community resources. Immigrant parents' awareness of and participation in available child care and early education programs are shaped by multiple factors, including the circumstance and period of residence in the U.S., their country of origin, their experiences with child care and early education in their home countries, their own education level, and their proficiency in English.

At Denise Louie, parents and children have access to bilingual, bicultural teachers that can build a relationship of trust and respect with families. We have been able to build bridges for families to resources and information that benefit their children and allow us to reach our target population each year.

While 85% of a child's core brain structure is formed by age three, less than 4% of public investment in education and child development occurs during that time.


Family Support Services

Our family support program provides parents with parent education on anything from kindergarten readiness, nutrition, financial literacy to housing, immigration rights, and healthcare. Going hand-in-hand with this support is encouraging parent involvement. Parent Involvement represents a significant component of our Head Start program. Parents are asked to share their skills at our school, whether it is volunteering in the classroom or serving as classroom representatives on our policy council that informs our programmatic decisions.

This past year, we had a family whose father had lost his job. The Family Support team helped him assess his skills and discussed what kind of employment he wanted in the future. Together they partnered to get all of the volunteer requirements completed, and he volunteered at our office. He volunteered for one year, assisting our program with filing, tracking program information on spreadsheets, and creating demographic reports. All the while, it was important for his child to see him participating in her school, as parent involvement has been shown to be important for student success. After one year, he was employed by the City of Seattle. He was thrilled with receiving this position and attributes it to the support from DLEC. Since then, we have heard that the family is doing terrific and that the father continues to love his new employment.



Tamara Vargas-Hernandez (mother) is originally from Guatemala. She recently moved from New York to Seattle and has already accomplished many things that will help her child succeed in life and school readiness. Since the beginning of this school year, she has successfully applied for health insurance for both herself and her child; she recently went with our Family Service Specialist Rosa Hernandez to apply for a library card so that she can read books with her child; she has begun ESL classes at the Atlantic Street Center; and is now getting her driver's license and attending Seattle Central Community College.

Early Head Start

Last year, our Early Head Start program, which serves low-income women and families with children birth to 3 years of age, encouraged healthy development by serving:



Out of the 30 children who aged out of Early Head Start, 20 entered a Head Start program and 9 entered an early childhood program.



In 2013-14, the program implemented targeted activity plans for children who did not demonstrate skills for their age group. After one month, 97% of them demonstrated skills and met the program's child development goals.

Early Head Start Outcomes

Early Head Start – Home Visitors

Home Visitors meet with children and families weekly for ninety minutes to provide early childhood education activities, parent support, and health services. Parents participating in the program share that they feel more capable, less isolated, and are better able to connect with community resources. Socialization events have a monthly parent education topic selected by the parents. Community partners donate their time to lead parent-education topic selected by the provide 8 week circle of security and S.T.EP. Parenting Groups.

In 2013-2014, Denise Louie's Home Visitors referred families to the following services



Play and Learn


Kaleidoscope Play and Learn is a program for parents and caregivers of young children to learn and explore together. This is a weekly 90 minute facilitated program designed to support the development of children's school readiness skills and to provide education and support for parents and caregivers. It is a free program open to the general public and takes place in partnership with the King County Public Library facilities.

This past year, we served over 200 parents and caregivers at 4 service sites. We hosted play and learn groups at Rainier Beach, Columbia City, Lake City and South Park libraries.


- 96% of eligible participants achieved the outcome of strengthening or acquiring parenting skills
- 30% of our adult participants were relatives caring for a child and age 55+
- 92% of our households surveyed were 80% or less of the median income for King County, 62% were 30% or less of the median income



FY14 Audited Expenses \$4,931,520






FY15 Budgeted Revenue
