Our Children

Ensuring a Successful Start

Early Head Start (EHS) provides low-income families and women with children ages birth to three or who are pregnant with services to prepare their child for success. These services include weekly 90-minute home visits to provide caregivers with early learning activities, parent support, and health services in their home languages; bi-monthly socialization events to bring together caregivers to learn about topics they choose, from financial planning to health education; and early intervention through regular assessments of children's developmental milestones to identify special needs and provide resources as early as possible.

- 21 infants, 98 toddlers, 6 pregnant mothers
- 86% of EHS children improved or maintained 4 out of 6 developmental domains that indicate school readiness



Preparing Kids for Kindergarten

Our preschool program serves predominantly immigrant and refugee families whose children are between ages three and five, and have an income under \$25,100 for a family of four. Priority for enrollment into the program is given to children in foster care, families experiencing homelessness, and children with special needs.

- 4 preschool centers
- 234 children served throughout the program year

During the 2022-2023 program year, **79%** of children enrolled in the Head Start program were up to date on the schedule of preventative and primary health care and **41%** of the children were up-to-date on dental exams. The preventative health care numbers was **higher by 5%** than the year prior, reflecting a growing trend to go back to the doctors' office.




Efforts to Prepare Children for Kindergarten

Denise Louie Education Center works to ensure that all children are ready for school. With this in mind, and with the help of parents and teachers, we developed school readiness goals that are tailored to each program. Each school readiness goal was created using information from parents, teachers, and data collected through assessment and observation tools.

During the program year 2022-2023, our goal was that **85%** of children would meet kindergarten readiness targets in **4 of the 6 domains**. We met our goal of **85%** children meeting/exceeding in our school readiness goals by Spring in all domains except Language and Literacy. The data shows that we have met that goal in PY22-23 with **86%** of EHS children having improved or maintained **4 out of 6 developmental domains** that indicate school readiness.

Key Takeaways from the Assessments Illustrated:


- The percentage of children meeting/exceeding in each TSG domain **increased** each quarter.
- Areas that did not quite meet our goal of 85% meeting or exceeding by Spring quarter were Language and Literacy.
- We are so proud of DLEC children for their growth in Social-Emotional and Math skills, since these are challenging areas around the state right now.

2022-2023 Program Budget


The program's operating budget includes Expenses for Educational and Program Services, as well as Management and General expenses. Education and Program Expenses include line items for instruction, such as teacher salaries and benefits, classroom supplies, and other teaching-related expenses; family engagement, which includes social service staff and support for parent activities and kindergarten transition; interventions, which include health, mental health, and nutrition; staff professional development, which includes training and technical assistance for staff and supervision and support expenses.




FAMILIES SERVED

Our Commitment to Our Families

Engaging and Listening to Our Parents & Guardians

Last program year, Denise Louie hosted monthly parent nights where families help choose topics and speakers to identify and support their most immediate needs, with topics ranging from financial literacy, nutrition, and special needs. Our preschool classrooms also have parent-teacher conferences and home visits throughout the year to facilitate more intimate dialogues on children’s educational progress. We encourage families to help children with their homework, as well as to provide us with ongoing feedback, and we welcome families to volunteer in classrooms.

Our Policy Council is integral to our programs’ success and represents the families we serve. Every year, parent representatives are elected from both HS and EHS programs. Our parent-led Policy Council functions in partnership with our Board of Directors to approve policies, budgets and hiring decisions, as well as provide program feedback.

Our family support and home visiting teams connect and educate parents on available resources from housing and nutrition to immigrant rights.

In our End of the Year survey, we asked our parents two questions: ‘How have Parent-Teacher Conferences helped your understanding of your child's education?’ and ‘How has Mobility Mentoring with your FSS helped your family this year?’

- **76%** said they have gained confidence in their ability to help their child be prepared for kindergarten
- **62%** said they have a better understanding of the importance of their involvement in their child's education
- **50%** said they know better how to meet their family’s needs
- **41%** said they have more resources and information they need to live a healthy lifestyle

Play and Learn Successes!

Supporting Caregivers: Kaleidoscope Play & Learn

Play & Learn is a program for parents and caregivers of young children to learn and explore together. This facilitated program is designed to support the development of children's school readiness skills and to provide education and support for parents and caregivers. After providing remote and outdoor groups for nearly 2.5 years due to the pandemic, we safely transitioned back to onsite services in the Seattle Public Libraries in the fall of 2022.

Since that time, we have had **192** caregivers and **215** children join us for Play & Learn. As one of the first public programs to return to in-person services for the birth through 5 years age range, Play & Learn provided many children with their first opportunity to socialize with peers. Play & Learn groups are held weekly in the Lake City, Columbia, and Rainier Beach libraries.

Of surveyed participants,

- **88%** said the program increased their understanding of child development.
- **85%** said they were more likely to use community activities or services to help the child in their care learn and be healthy.
- **84%** said they felt more supported as a parent or caregiver in their community.
- **83%** reported an increase in understanding that children develop school-readiness skills when they play.
- **100%** of participants who completed the survey said they would recommend our program to others who care for young children.
